Guidelines for Recurrent Urinary Tract Infections in ...

Continuous antibiotic prophylaxis is effective in reducing UTI frequency in CISC users with recurrent UTIs, and it is well tolerated in these individuals. However, increased resistance of urinary bacteria is a concern that requires surveillance if prophylaxis is started.

Women with recurrent symptomatic urinary tract infections can be treated with continuous or postcoital prophylactic antibiotics; other treatment options include self-started antibiotics, cranberry ...

Antibiotic prophylaxis 1.1.9 For women with recurrent UTI who are not pregnant and have had no improvement after the management options in recommendations 1.1.6 and 1.1.7, consider single-dose antibiotic prophylaxis when exposed to triggers (see the recommendations on choice of antibiotic prophylaxis). Take account of:

Due to acute illness caused by UTI and the risk of pyelonephritis-induced permanent kidney damage, many children are given long-term (several months to 2 years) antibiotics aimed at ...

For humans. Antibiotic prophylaxis is most commonly used prior to dental surgery or medical surgery, however, may be used in other cases, such prior to sexual intercourse for patients who suffer from recurrent urinary tract infections..
